Helping Families When They Need it Most

In order to offer the Concordia experience to more families and students from the Omaha metro community, Concordia provides needs-based financial assistance. More than 25% of enrolling families apply and qualify for financial scholarship. For the 2019-2020 school year, the total financial support for Concordia K-12 students is \$729,750. One family that has been blessed by the gift of financial scholarship is the Stevens family. Since April 2018, Christy Stevens, an Omaha Police Sergeant, has had numerous life threatening health issues that have kept her from being able to work. Through it all, she fought to survive for her children and says that "God touched me and let me know I was going to be okay". Christy's children Jaylee (10), Anthony (7), Dante (6), and Ile (5) have all benefited from the small class sizes at Concordia Academy and the family atmosphere. Through all of Christy's health crises, school has been a constant support network for them. At Concordia, they are receiving the gospel message of hope, love and the possibility of miracles every single day!

Concordia Lutheran Schools of Omaha Foundation

In 2000, Concordia Lutheran Schools of Omaha (CLSO), formerly Wider Omaha Lutheran Schools Association (WOLSA), was blessed with a gift of 40 acres of land and a training facility for horses on the northwest corner of 156th and Fort Streets. Soon after, a campaign was mounted to help convert the gift into a junior/senior high school campus. Some donors asked that their gift go to an endowment with earnings supporting student scholarships. To meet this desire, a task team was formed to recommend the best way to be good stewards of the donor gifts. It was recommended that WOLSA form a separate foundation to oversee the stewardship of the endowment's assets at the direction of the School Board of Directors, The WOLSA School Board of directors approved the recommendation by 2001. The name of the school and foundation was officially changed to Concordia Lutheran Schools of Omaha and Foundation (CLSO).

The purpose of the CLSO Foundation is to support Concordia Schools of Omaha. This is done by investing and managing donated dollars to fund student scholarships, general school sustainability and capital expenditures. The current priority of the Foundation is to increase its general endowment to support scholarships and mission advancement.

The CLSO Foundation partners with the School Board of Directors to assist with advancement efforts and manage assets so its use is consistent with Concordia's mission, vision and strategic plan. The spending policy is between 4% and 5% per year of the market value of the endowment assets.


As of June 30, 2019, the Foundation endowment assets totaled

Over the last three fiscal years, the following distributions have been made to fund student scholarships.


2017 : \$55,000 2018 : \$70,000 2019 : \$155,000

The endowment is invested with the goal of minimizing the level of risk needed to generate returns that will support the ongoing needs of the school. Assets are invested across all major publicly traded securities to diversify the endowment's sources of risk and return.




