


MINISTRY — THAT — LIVES ON

WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF THE FORWARD WITH FAITH CAMPAIGN?

The goal of this campaign is to raise \$3 million which will pay off half of the total debt Concordia currently owes.

WHEN AND FOR WHAT WAS THIS DEBT ACCRUED?

In 2000, when the West Omaha Lutheran School Association (now Concordia Lutheran Schools of Omaha) was gifted the land and horse stables at 156th and Fort St., taking out a loan was the only way to establish a campus for programming to middle and high school grades. Accordingly, the vast majority (\$5.49 million) of the current debt was incurred as the result of a young, rapidly growing Lutheran school. The remainder of Concordia's debt is composed of a \$500,000 line of credit and a \$118,000 loan for school vehicles. Together, these sources total \$6 million.

HOW MUCH DOES CONCORDIA DISBURSE IN DEBT PAYMENTS CURRENTLY?

Each month, Concordia's debt service payment is \$33,608, or just over **\$400,000** per year. Approximately \$20,000 of each monthly payment addresses the debt principal while the balance goes toward interest. Since 2003, Concordia has paid nearly \$6 million in debt service to the Lutheran Church Extension Fund. It is only by working to eliminate the principal that our school community can move on from simply sustaining the good work that we do to building our capacity for even better ministry to our students and community.

HOW WILL ELIMINATING \$3 MILLION IN DEBT IMPACT CONCORDIA'S BUDGET?

For every \$500,000 applied toward the debt principal, Concordia will save \$36,000 annually. Thus, eliminating \$3 million of the debt would result in \$216,000 in savings per year. This would not only put Concordia firmly on the path to being debt-free. It would provide immediate and significant stability for Concordia's financial footing and, in the future, provide funding for scholarship support and program enhancements.
